#### Mirrors of the Face of God

In his novel, *Till We Have Faces*, Christian author C.S. Lewis provides a retelling of the Greek myth of Cupid and Psyche. In his version, Psyche is spirited away by the winds to live in an incredible palace on the Grey Mountain as the wife of an unseen god. Her sister, Orual, ventures to find her to bring her home.

Upon Orual's arrival, Psyche relates the story of her journey and life on the Grey Mountain. She tells Orual of the great palace she lives in, the wonderful feasts that appear each day, and of her husband, a god, who visits with her nightly but who remains hidden and forbids Psyche from seeing his face when he visits each evening.

But Orual can see no palace, no grand feasts, and certainly no god. Orual cannot believe that Psyche is actually the spouse of this unseen and unnamed god. For Orual, highly educated and guided by common sense, Psyche's faith in her husband is ridiculous. It must be untrue. This "god" must be either a terrifying brute or a conniving liar.

The truth is clear: Psyche's god-husband is a myth; a fable and Psyche is at best crazed or delusional. After all anyone with common sense would agree that there can be no such god, invisible and hidden and yet good and lovely. Surely, if he were pleasing and good, he would reveal himself plainly?

To a disciple of Christ living in our modern era, it often seems as if we are surrounded by our own collection of Oruals. To them the life of discipleship makes little sense; easily dismissed as myth or delusion. But when we open ourselves fully to our unseen God, we realize that the disciple's life is a deep and intimate relationship that produces a greater and deeper love, not only for God, but for everyone around us.

The world around us says that our love is fake or illusory, but it only seems as such to someone who has not opened themselves to encounter the Living God, He Who is Love.

#### **Book Review:**

#### The Bridge of San Luis Rey by Thornton Wilder

The Bridge of San Luis Rey by Thornton Wilder was published in 1927. It is a well-written short novel (148 pages in my paperback) that takes place in Peru in the early 18<sup>th</sup> century, evoking life in the Spanish colony at that time. It won the Pulitzer Prize in 1928, and in 1998, it was selected by the editorial board of the American Modern Library as one of the 100 best novels of the twentieth century.

This novel begins when five people unexpectedly fall to their deaths when a tiny rope footbridge collapses. Brother Juniper, a Franciscan missionary, sets out to trace the lives of the victims, linked only by their deaths, to understand the seemingly random nature of the tragedy.

The novel endeavors to consider big philosophical and religious questions: Are the deaths of these five people just a random accident, or is it part of God's plan? Why does it seem that the good die before the bad? What do those left behind learn from tragic deaths?

Thornton Wilder said he sought to address the question: "Is there a direction and meaning in lives beyond the individual's own will?"

In 2001 at the memorial service for victims of the September 11 attacks, British Prime Minister Tony Blair quoted the following excerpt from the book:

"But soon we will die, and all memories of those five will have left earth, and we ourselves shall be loved for a while and forgotten. But the love will have been enough; all those impulses of love return to the love that made them. Even memory is not necessary for love. There is a land of the living and a land of the dead, and the bridge is love, the only survival, the only meaning."

If you like good writing and pondering the big philosophical and religious questions of life and death, you will like this book.

Jesus saves us from our sins.

To do this, Jesus reconciles us to the Father. He restores kinship with us. He makes us a brother to Him, a son to the Father, and, as a member of a royal family, an heir to the Kingdom of God.

Unfortunately, we look at life through a soda straw. We focus on the minutiae on the other end: the house, the career, and the activities. Drop the straw and take in the big picture. Look at the stars one night; you are an heir to all of it as a son of the Father.

But God offers even more than just the universe. He offers Himself.

To do this, Jesus justifies us. He calls us to the fullness of holiness. As Christ became man and assumed two natures, Jesus raises us up to his own Divine Nature.

We are made for eternal life, just like an airplane is made for flying. Although we were "grounded" after sin with mortality, we still have two capacities in our immortal soul that must soar: the ability to know (truth) and the ability to will (love). Our endless imagination is a great example.

God intends to raise us to divine nature by growing in holiness. We achieve holiness as we work to perfect our knowledge and will, to truth and pure love, through faith and charity. We can even use reason, so pick up a good religious book or study program. As we grow in holiness, we grow in

Divine Nature and become beautiful, just like the Saints.

Where do we start? We must accept God's plan for us. We must seek God's Will first.

Christ offered a simple prayer for us through St. Faustina to abandon our will.

"Entrust yourself completely to My will saying, 'Not as I want, but according to Your will, O God, let it be done unto me.' These words, spoken from the depths of one's heart, can raise a soul to the summit of sanctity in a short time." - Jesus as quoted in a Diary of a Soul by St. Faustina

Please know that "Jesus Saves" that it means a lot more than redemption. It also means fullness of life through reconciliation and justification. We are freed from bad debt, but we also gain kinship and Divine Nature.
